## YEAR 11 CAMP

In Week 3, the Year 11 students attended the annual tertiary education camp in Adelaide. The camp gives students the opportunity to find out a bit more about university options and to see campuses, accommodation and support services firsthand.

It was a busy week and both camp groups were blessed with excellent weather, which was very helpful as there was quite a bit of walking to do. On the first day, we travelled to Flinders University for a short presentation, tour and practically focussed workshops. Later on in the day there was plenty of energy expended at Bounce. The day ended at the campsite with students enjoying a pizza dinner.



On the second day, it was off to UniSA to view the campus at City East, and to find out more about what's involved in making the decision to study at university. Then it was on to the University of Adelaide to find out about course offerings and for a tour of the main buildings and student facilities. At each of the universities, we were able to hear from current students about their experiences, which was a great way for our students to get information firsthand.

On the second evening, we were hosted by Lincoln College, Aquinas College and St Marks for dinner and a tour. These visits were a great way to see what residential college life was all about and students were excited to meet up with several Old Scholars who shared their stories. And if that doesn't sound like enough, there was time for shopping, a trip on the tram to Glenelg and an obligatory visit to the Adelaide Central Market. ### ROSTRUM VOICE OF YOUTH COMPETITION

On Wednesday May 10, students competed in the annual Rostrum Voice of Youth competition. This year, sixteen students from our region competed on the night, and ten of them were from St Martins.

Participants had to write a prepared speech of 6 minutes. They were given a range of topics, and spent weeks doing research, finding information about their chosen field. The group of Year 7 and 9 students attended a workshop in Term 1 as well as many other meetings with Miss Van der Berg. The Year 7 and 9 English teachers also put in a lot of work to support our students.

The competition also requires contestants to write a 3 minute speech on the night. Students are given 3 topics to choose from and 15 minutes to plan this short speech. This year the topics were "Ups and downs", "Time for me" and "Peer pressure". Our students faced this challenge courageously, delivering inspiring messages to the audience.

While only one winner is chosen from each heat, the organisers of the competition also choose "wild card" entries. Emma Johnson in Year 9 was identified as one of these entries and will be competing in the semi-final competition in Adelaide on May 27.

Special thanks to Mrs. Quintel and Pastor Jon for coming along and watching the students! All our competitors were fantastic ambassadors for St Martin's Lutheran College and we look forward to sharing their future achievements.
